### NOW THAT THE SYNOD ON "SYNODALITY" IS OVER

The Synod on Synodality has been concluded in Rome, the second part of the meetings which were begun in 2023. What is synodality, everyone has been wondering? Basically, it seems to be that the Church should arrive at decisions from discussions among its members, rather than from the hierarchy, the Pope and the Bishops. It would be good to hear what Pope St. Pius X said about all this in the encyclical Pascendi Dominici Gregis, in 1907, which described and condemned the errors of the Modernists: "23. A wider field for comment is opened when we come to what the Modernist school has imagined to be the nature of the Church. They begin with the supposition that the Church has birth in a double need: first, the need of the individual believer to communicate his faith to others, especially if he has some original and special experience, and secondly, when the faith has become common to many, the need of the collectivity to form itself into a society and to guard, promote and propagate the common good. What then, is the Church? It is the product of the collective conscience, that is to say, of the association of individual consciences, whereby virtue of the principle of vital permanence, depends all on one first believer, who for Catholics, is Christ. Now every society needs a directing authority to guide its members to a common end, to foster prudently the elements of cohesion, which in a religious society are doctrine and worship. Hence, the triple authority in the Catholic Church, disciplinary, dogmatic, liturgical. The nature of this authority is to be gathered from its origin, and its rights and duties from its nature. In past times it was a common error that authority came to the Church from without, that is to say, directly from God; and it was then rightly held to be autocratic. But this conception has now grown obsolete. For in the same way as the Church is a vital emanation from the collectivity of consciences, so too authority emanates vitally from the Church itself. Authority, therefore, like the Church, has its origins in the religious conscience, and, that being so, is subject to it. Should it disown this dependence, it becomes a tyranny. For we are living in an age when the sense of liberty has reached its highest development. In the civil order, the public conscience has introduced popular government. Now there is in man only one conscience, just as there is only one life. It is for the ecclesiastical authority, therefore, to adopt a democratic form, unless it wishes to provoke and foment an intestine (sic) conflict in the consciences of mankind. The penalty of refusal is disaster. For it is madness to think that the sentiment of liberty, as it now obtains, can recede. Were it forcibly pent up and held in bonds, the more terrible would be its outburst, sweeping away both the Church and religion. Such is the situation in the minds of the Modernists, and their one great anxiety is, in consequence, to find a way of conciliation between the authority of the Church and the liberty of the believers."

(To make the practical connection to the recent Synod: This is why some delegates to the Synod kept pushing for such ideas as the ordination of women as deacons, the change in the teaching on homosexual practices, or the doctrinal authority of national episcopal conferences).
