## A Great Aid in Living in Purity for Christ

St. Thomas Aquinas, known as the Angelic Doctor for his sublime teaching, was imprisoned by his own family in one of their castles when he was a young man. He had infuriated them by deciding to join the newly founded Dominican Order, who supported themselves by begging (mendicants), rather than the ancient Benedictine Order, where he was sure to be made an abbot of a prosperous monastery, due to his family's nobility. In order to break his will, and his vow of chastity, his brothers brought a half-naked prostitute into his room in the castle to seduce him. St. Thomas picked up a hot iron from the fireplace, and hurled it at the woman. After she fled, he branded the door with the sign of the Cross. In the documents for his canonization, we read that then St. Thomas fell into a mystical state, and two angels came to wrap his waist in a cord. promising him that he would never be tempted against holy purity again. This cord the Saint wore of course, for the rest of his life. Today, that cord, a relic now, is venerated in the town of Chieri, near Turin, Italy. Many of the faithful over the centuries have venerated that cord and even touched cords which they brought with them, asking for St. Thomas' help and intercession in maintaining purity.

Eventually, the Dominican Fathers began a "Confraternity of Angelic Warfare": an association of men and women striving to live chastely, in their own state of life. They devote themselves to reciting specific prayers each day, and wearing a cord that is specially blessed to invoke and imitate St. Thomas Aquinas.

This Confraternity is becoming increasingly popular in our day when the challenge of living chastely is so difficult, so poorly understood, and so unpopular.
