# ST. THOMAS AQUINAS ON THE MOST HOLY EUCHARIST

Christ offered His Body to God the Father on the altar of the Cross as a sacrifice for our reconciliation. He shed His blood for our ransom and purification, so that we could be redeemed from our miserable state of slavery and purged from all sin. But to make sure that the memory of so great a gift would remain with us forever, He left His Body as food and His Blood as drink for the faithful to consume in the form of bread and wine.

O precious and marvelous Banquet, that brings salvation and contains all sweetness. Could anything be of more value in itself? Under the Old Covenant, the flesh of calves and goats was offered, but here, Christ Himself, the true God, is set before us as our food. What could be more marvelous than this? No other sacrament has more power to heal. Through this Sacrament, sins are cleansed away, virtues are increased, and the soul is made rich with an abundance of every spiritual gift. It is offered in the Church for both the living and the dead, so that what He instituted for the salvation of all, may be for the benefit of all. Even so, in the end, no one can fully express the sweetness of this Sacrament, in which spiritual delight is tasted at its very Source, and in which we renew the memory of that surpassing love which Christ displayed in His passion.

To impress the greatness of this love more firmly upon the hearts of the faithful, Our Lord instituted this Sacrament at the Last Supper. As He was about to leave this world and return to the Father, after celebrating the Passover with His disciples, He left It as a perpetual memorial of His Passion.

(St. Thomas Aquinas, *On the Feast of Corpus Christi, 1-4.* St. Thomas Aquinas' feast day is 28 January. He lived from 1225-1274. He was a Dominican friar, who wrote vast theological works of great import, so that he is a Doctor of the Church).
