THE GLORY OF MARTYRDOM

In the martyrs of today, those to whom we have a continual debt of faith and love, we know Christ as Thomas was taught to know Him, by His wounds, by the stigmata of His Passion.

They too manifest the hidden life of the risen Lord. Many of them are literally hidden. They are not even names to us, not even faces in a newspaper photograph. Hidden from sight, out of reach of ordinary human sympathy, they have even lost their identity-or, rather, their only identity is Christ. In places where, but for them, He would never come, they are proving that He is still upon earth, alive after His Passion. By their living deaths, they are proving that He has conquered death.

Others, like their Lord, are held up for the whole world to see: in them too His glory is hidden; they have no comeliness whereby we shall know Him; they are whole identified with His suffering: mocked, disfigured, covered in man's spitting. False witness is brought against them. They are crowned with thorns. To many people they seem to fail; through the means available to modern persecutors, their enemies can even destroy their minds. They must suffer Christ's bitterest grief: the knowledge that their very martyrdom may scatter their flocks.

Perhaps most difficult of all to realize, or to believe, that the risen Christ is hidden in our own lives. Difficult not only for others, but for ourselves. If His purpose in indwelling men is to radiate light and heat of His love through the whole world, how can we honestly believe that He chooses people for such a mission who have no great talents, no work of importance, nothing to show for the work they have done, and no influence; people moreover whose circumstances, humanly speaking, are, by God's own will for them, both cramping and inescapable?

But it is precisely from such lives that His love can and does radiate.
