The Danger of Spiritual Gluttony

There is much to say about what we might call spiritual gluttony. Few if any beginners in the spiritual life, however good their progress, avoid this sin. Many of the imperfections to which beginners are liable arise from the sweetness they find in spiritual exercises as they begin.

These beginners, delighting in the sweetness and joy of their spiritual activities, pursue this spiritual sweetness. Yet they should instead be pursuing purity and the discretion that are pleasing and acceptable to God along the whole course of the spiritual way. Worse yet, in addition to making the mistake of striving for sweetness in devotion, they become possessed by spiritual gluttony. Though virtue is acquired through moderation-in fact, it consists in moderation-this gluttony forces them to become immoderate.

Through the allure of the spiritual delights they experience, some of them nearly kill themselves by penances, and others weaken themselves by fasting. They take upon themselves more than they can bear, without rule or advice. They try to conceal their austerities from those whom they are bound to obey, and some even venture to practice them when they have received instructions and obedience. To obey those who are wiser is to practice penance of the reason and judgment-a sweeter and more acceptable sacrifice to God than all the acts of bodily penance.

Bodily penance that is nothing more than a mere suffering of the body might as well be imposed on animals. It is full of imperfections when the penance of the will is neglected.
