## *THE AMAZING SISTER WILHELMINA, OSB*

In His merciful goodness, our Blessed Lord has given the Church in the United States a tremendous gift of love, hope, faith and joy! I speak of the Foundress of the Benedictines of Mary, Queen of the Apostles, Sister M. Wilhelmina.

Born Mary Elizabeth Lancaster to a WWI veteran and a former teacher in St. Louis, MO during the Depression. Her father was not a Catholic, but her mother converted him. Mary Elizabeth's mother went on to convert another 100 or so of her race before her life on earth came to an end. Little Mary Elizabeth had her first vision of Our Lady when she was 2 years old. She was sitting in her high-chair, and the Mother of God appeared dressed in all-white. She said nothing to the little girl. When, in April 1934, she made her First Holy Communion, Our Lord Himself spoke to her, asking her, "Will you be Mine?"

She graduated from the first all-black Catholic High School in the state, staffed by the Oblate Sisters of Providence, a community of black women. She had determined to enter their novitiate upon graduation. When she arrived at the Chapel of the Novitiate, again Our Lord appeared to her, and put His arms around her.

In religion, she received the name of "Wilhelmina", in honor of the priest who had made over 200 converts in less than nine months by walking the streets of the Black neighborhood, Fr. William Markoe. As an Oblate of Providence, Sister taught music, Latin and other subjects for many years, and was very content as a Religious. When the upheavals occurred after the II Vatican Council, the Sisters of Providence went through the "renewal" engineered by the "experts" that have destroyed religious life in the post-Vatican II Church. But Sister Wilhelmina did her best to convince her fellow sisters to retain a communal life of prayer, the best practices of traditional religious life and the holy habit. As time went on, she could see that they were not going to turn back. So, Sister Wilhelmina decided to leave the OSPs and found a new Order: The Oblates of Mary, Queen of the Apostles. Today, they are formally known as the "The Benedictine of Mary, Queen of the Apostles".

So, long story short, this humble, reserved and faithful nun established the Order that today is thriving with young vocations.

They are faithful to the traditions of the Church, including the Holy Mass and the Divine Office in the traditional rite. The nuns have built a beautiful Monastery in Gower, MO and now are raising a second one in Ava, MO. Sister Wilhelmina died in 2019 at the age of 95, and was buried in a simple wooden coffin in the monastery cemetery. This past April, her body was exhumed to be relocated in the Church of the monastery. It was found to be totally incorrupt, as was her habit. Now, reports of miracles are being told!
