On the Mystery of Christ's Resurrection

(From "Credo", The Catechism of Bishop Athanasius Schneider)

- #425. What is the most glorious mystery of Our Lord's life?
The mystery of His resurrection from the dead.
- #426. On what day did He rise again?
At dawn on the third day after His death, i.e. on the first day of the week: Sunday, or Dies Domenica (the Lord's Day).
- #427. How was Jesus raised to life?
By a unique act of His divine omnipotence (in union with the Father and the Holy Spirit), He reunited His own soul to His body, and came forth living from the tomb.
- #428. What qualities did Christ's body possess when it came out of the tomb?
It had the qualities of glorified bodies: brightness, impassibility, agility, and subtlety.
- #429. What is "brightness"?
A brilliance capable of radiance greater than the sun, such as Our Lord revealed on Mt. Tabor (see Mk. 9:2-13; Mt. 17:1-13; and Lk. 9:28-36).
- # 430. What is impassibility?
Exemption from all suffering and enjoying perpetual youth, generally thought to be around the age of thirty-three years, as when Our Lord carried out the principal acts of the Redemption.
- #431. What is agility?
The ability to move from place to place with the rapidity of thought, as Our Lord demonstrated to the disciples of Emmaus, (Lk. 24:13-35)
- #432. What is subtlety?
The property of the body being entirely submissive to the soul and expressive of it, as shown by the glorified wounds of Our Lord, (see John 20:27).
- #433. Why is Our Lord's Resurrection of such great importance?
It is of first importance because it is: 1. The foundation of our faith (See I Cor. 15:14-17); 2. The means whereby the fruits of the Redemption are applied to us (See I Pt. 1:3); 3. The model of our spiritual life (see Rom. 6:4-11); 4. The cause of our future resurrection.
